Who We Are

The Children's Home Society of West Virginia is a private, non-profit child welfare organization founded in 1896. The Society is a participatory organization consisting of employees, foster families, adoptive families, volunteers, Board of Directors, Director Emeriti, advisory council members, donors, benefactors, supporters, and friends. We are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors that is representative of the communities we serve from around the state. We are licensed to provide child welfare and behavioral health services in West Virginia. We are fully accredited by the Council on Accreditation of Services for Families and Children. Comprehensive child welfare, behavioral health, social casework, and advocacy provided services to **14,629** children and their families from our thirteen primary locations throughout the state. Some of our current programs are statewide adoption, foster care, emergency child shelter care, as well as in-home and in-community services for children and families, respite care, parent education and training, prenatal and early childhood services, volunteer and mentoring services, therapy services, school based social work, and comprehensive assessment services.

Today CHSWV foster family support groups are organized across the state thanks to a special woman that was creative, passionate and enthusiastic. Ruth left a legacy of encouragement, love and kindness.

Mid-Town Family Resource Center



Since 1998, the Parkersburg site of the Children's Home Society of WV has operated a series of neighborhood-based prevention, youth development, and family support services. The Mid-Town Family Resource Center received initial funding

from the WVDHHR in 2011 to operate as one of the state's 25 Starting Points Family Resource Centers. An upcoming renewal of that funding will rename the centers as Family Support Centers. The focus of our center is to support and strengthen neighborhood families, to provide concrete assistance in the form of food, baby items, clothing, school supplies and personal care items, and to empower families to learn about resources and opportunities available to them in the community.

Child abuse/neglect prevention, accomplished by promoting parental competencies, is also a primary focus. Partnering with the agency's Parents as Teachers program and other local child-serving agencies helps provide parent support components. Neighborhood parents are given opportunities to meet together to give and gain support, learn and practice parenting skills, and gain knowledge to help relieve stressors for their family. With the assistance of TEAM for WV Children's Partners in Prevention funding, family engagement and youth activities, geared towards a variety of age groups, are planned monthly with community-wide events held several times a year. Additional concrete support is also provided for families in need who have children enrolled at Jefferson Elementary Center.

Programming for school-aged youth is offered through an After School program for students at Jefferson Elementary. Licensed through the West Virginia Department of Health and Human Resources, this low-cost fee-based program accepts students whose parents receive subsidized child care assistance as well as those who are able to pay their own fees.

The program's goals include raising academic achievement, promoting family and community involvement, increasing social-emotional development for youth, and inspiring social responsibility through service learning projects. Students enjoy crafts, recreation and other individual and group activities.

Partnerships with the Parkersburg Art Center and WVU Extension service add extra enrichment opportunities. During the summer, the site offers a six-week Summer Youth Program. A collaboration with the Dept. of Education and Wood County School's Food Service program provides free lunch and snack for neighborhood youth, while programming includes guest speakers, field trips and other learning and skill-building activities.

The Family Resource Center has hosted a variety of activities sponsored by other programs of Children's Home Society, including dinners and events for our Permanency Program, WECAN Mentoring, Early Childhood programs and a Drop-In center for the Transitional and Independent Living Programs. The past few years, we have served the community by distributing donations of Christmas gifts to nearly 500 children in need.

In January, 2010, America's Promise designated our Parkersburg site as a Promise Place. By demonstrating that local Children's Home Society's programs provide access to caring adults, safe places, a healthy start, an effective education, and opportunities to help others, we have joined the nation's largest partnerships providing supports to young people. In the fiscal year ending June 2022, services were provided to over 1800 individuals.

The Food Pantry/Hygiene Closet at the Mid-Town Family Resource Center is accessible for persons with disabilities and is open Monday – Friday 8:30am – 4:30pm and occasionally on Saturdays or evenings for special events. The resource center provides a unique role for the community; collaborating and coordinating services to meet the needs of the families it serves.



Playground Full of Help



Our Resource Centers play an important role in our efforts to help families in their own communities across the state. They provide a variety of items to help meet emergent needs and assist families during times of financial hardships.

During the 2021-2022 fiscal year, our Resource Centers assisted **4,155** individuals statewide. These children and their families were able to benefit from the in-kind support given to CHS by numerous businesses, individuals, churches, and civic groups throughout West Virginia.

Southern West Virginia Exceptional Youth Emergency Shelter

For 40 years, the Children's Home Society has been helping children in the Raleigh County community. The Cherry Hill Shelter opened in 1982 on C&O Dam Road in Daniels, WV, serving eight children ages 7 through 17. In 2004, the shelter became the Southern West Virginia Exceptional Youth Emergency Shelter (SWVEYES) with a 5 bed capacity.

The shelter focused on meeting the needs of autistic children and children with developmental delays. At the time, it was the only shelter of its kind. SWVEYES continues to remain the only emergency child shelter in West Virginia that holds a criteria for children with exceptionalities which include; an IQ below 70, Axis II Diagnosis or Autism.

The SWVEYES staff help children learn communication skills, coping skills and how to become independent. During the last four years, the shelter has served 45 youth for a total of 6,742 days of care.


Reasons for Giving

- Currently the SWEYES shelter has a capacity for 5 children. Many times children are placed in hotels or at the DHHR offices until another placement is available. Siblings are sometimes separated at placement due to the lack of bed availability.

- Children placed at the SWEYES shelter come there due to severe behavioral and mental health issues. Our staff are trained to meet the special needs of these types of children. Due to limited beds, many children who need these higher level services have to be placed in other facilities that cannot provide the level of care they need most. Increasing the number of beds at our shelter would allow us to help even more of these children.

- WE NEED MORE BEDS, more capacity, to meet the needs of West Virginia's Exceptional children.

- Four youth who were awaiting treatment were placed at the SWEYES shelter. While at SWEYES, they were able to stabilize and no longer required treatment. The youth have either been placed in a foster home, reunited with family or are close to finding a forever home.

Parkersburg Community Based Services

Children's Home Society's Parkersburg Community-Based Services office is growing and we need your help!

For nearly 30 years, the Children's Home Society has been helping children in the Parkersburg community. On July 1, 1992, the Children's Home Society acquired The Mid-Ohio Valley Regional Youth Shelter Care Facility located in Parkersburg. The Society renamed the shelter in honor of Judge Arthur N. Gustke, the local Juvenile Court judge who was instrumental in the formation of the original shelter and remained a longtime supporter until his death. The shelter is currently located at 1640 St. Marys Ave., and accepts 10 children ages 10-18 from all 55 counties in West Virginia.


During the 1990s we saw the expansion of the WECAN Mentoring program and other family strengthening programs to the Parkersburg area. Today our community-based services location provides services to the following counties: Calhoun, Doddridge, Gilmer, Jackson, Mason, Pleasants, Ritchie, Tyler, Wirt and Wood. Today,

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
