Berkeley County



100 South Queen St., Martinsburg

The Children's Home Society of WV Family Support Center in Martinsburg, located at 100 South Queen Street, has been serving and supporting Berkeley County residents since July 2022. Previously known as Berkeley County Family Support Center, The Monarch Family Support Center for Berkeley County celebrated their open house on February 28th, 2023 and announced our new name to the community and supportive partnerships. True to its name, the Monarch Family Support Center is symbolic of flourishment and growth of children and families and pays tribute to the West Virginia State butterfly as well as our dear Victoria Slater-Madert.

The Monarch Family Support Center for Berkeley County offers community-based services aimed at reducing the risk of child abuse and neglect by promoting nurturing families and preventing at risk families from having children removed from the home. The center is a donation and grant-based community-oriented hub of resources to help strengthen families through a variety of programs, services, education and referrals. The Monarch Family Support Center for Berkeley County is supplied with an emergency food pantry, clothing closet, infant supply closet, private interview space, and future computer room for job search and other needs. The emergency food pantry, clothing closet, infant supply closet at the Monarch Family Support Center for Berkeley County is open from Monday - Friday 9am-5pm and/or through appointment. The program plans on offering free parenting education classes in the near future.







Cabell County

In 2018, with the opening of the Janet Smith Vineyard Forever Families Center for Permanency, (Jan's House) the Huntington office began working toward a vision to serve the community in a deep and meaningful way. We started sharing that vision with others, and soon we were able to fill the clothing closet and begin serving families in need.

The harsh consequences of the Covid-19 pandemic resulted in more hardship for WV families and increased food insecurity. United Way of the River Cities answered the call to partner with us in stocking our food pantry, and with that, we were able to begin providing 100's of meals to hungry children and their families.

Since that time, the numerous supporters of the Nancy Stuart Tonkin Resource Center have helped us expand our resources to provide thousands of meals and clothing items, hygiene products, housewares, furniture, beds for children, and infant essentials such as diapers, formula, car seats and cribs. Every day we strive to help strengthen all families, including, biological, kinship, foster, and grand families, and anyone else with a need. In addition to the concrete supports, we also offer help in overcoming barriers to employment, linkage to healthcare and mental health services, parenting education, and skill building. We host events for children such as our Back to School Bash in August, where children of all ages in our community get to swim with friends, eat pizza, choose a new backpack filled with supplies, and receive new clothing to start the school year. In October we partner with the local high school's Key Club students to offer a safe and fun Trunk or Treat. Kids not only receive treats, but also take home new toothbrushes, and toothpaste, and parents receive information on good dental hygiene. This school year, we're hosting our first Cabell County Spring Break Camp. Underprivileged children in 1st-6th grades get to experience a "Trip Around the World" to learn about the cultures of Greece, Mexico, Japan & India. Other events include community clothing giveaways which we set up like a free yard sale. In November, we host a Thanksgiving food box giveaway that includes a turkey and all the other items needed for a delicious family meal. In December, we do the same, and also partner with our supporters to provide gifts for children of all ages, including the often forgotten teens.

The support that the Nancy Stuart Tonkin Resource Center receives from our community is growing exponentially. In-kind resources are coming in daily, sometimes multiple times per day. We simply could not have accomplished all we have without the individuals, businesses, organizations and volunteers that share our vision, and have hope for a brighter future for all WV children. Here are just a few of those heroes, Chris Miller, Assured Partners, Highlawn Presbyterian Church, Johnson Memorial United Methodist Church, Somerville and Co., The Women's Impact Network, Cabell Midland Key Club, The Leo's Club, The United Way of River Cities, The Pallottine Foundation, APG Polytech, Blue Goose International, ProCutters Landscaping, ProSource, The Elks Lodge, WSAZ Children's Charities, Recovery Point, MU Med School students, and so many, many more...

Along the increased costs for food, utilities, and other essentials, the families we serve are struggling more and more. Every day there is a story of desperation and urgent need. West Virginia's grand families raising grandchildren are in daily crisis trying to provide for their needs, and with recent changes in legislation, we also expect a significant increase in the need for infant essentials. Even with all we are doing, there is so much more we need and want to accomplish for our community's children and families.

Emily's Teen Parenting Resource Room

Emily's Teen Parenting Resource Room is housed in the Milton location for Children's Home Society of WV. Emily's seeks to serve teenage parents that are pregnant or parenting by providing baby and postpartum items and needed referrals in the community. We are currently serving teenage parents in Cabell, Wayne, Putnam, Lincoln, Logan, Boone, Kanawha, and Mason counties. We offer linkage to referrals for parenting education, WECAN mentoring, WIC, Right from the Start, Birth to Three, pregnancy options, adolescent gynecology, and more. We accept baby & maternity donations of all kinds so our teen parents don't leave our doors with empty hands. Our goal is that no teenage parent feels unfit for their new child. We have been able to connect with partners across our counties of service to be able to present the mission of Emily's statewide, and gain access to referrals in the school systems, gynecologists, and word of mouth. Our hope is to equip young parents with as many resources as necessary to help them succeed. Over and over again, we have been thankful to change the lives of our clients, and our hope is that we are able to continue that year after year.



Greenbrier County

Greenbrier Valley Children's Home

The Greenbrier Valley Children's Home uses our Blessing Box in the front of the shelter as our main source of giving back. We try our best to keep it stocked with food as the homeless population seems to be rising in our community. Through winter, we were able to pass out almost 50 blankets to those in the community, many who were homeless. Over the past 4 months we have provided countless people with shoes and clothing in our area. With the rising cost of everything, we have seen many people searching for hygiene and toiletry items. We have recently donated boxes of hygiene/toiletry items to 4 families in need. At Christmas we supplied toys for a gentleman who was given temporary custody of 2 family members. He continues to have custody of both children and we have provided



shoes, coats, backpacks, and hygiene products for the children to attend school while in his custody.

This definition of community perfectly encapsulates the mission of the Lewisburg site's, Building Better Communities Resource Center. Lewisburg makes it a priority to meet clients, friends and families right where they are. From house fires and tragedies to unexpected misfortunes, Lewisburg is most often "boots on the ground" before you can say GO. Providing for the population no matter the situation, every time. It's not unusual to see employees from the Lewisburg site packing their vehicles with supplies from toothbrushes and toiletries to beds and car seats heading to meet a client in need. Gerardo Calderon says it best, "You are not a Super Hero, you are better than that; you are real." These are real people, with real crisis, needs and emergencies and because of the "Community Closet" they know they have real friends in their corner.

Hampshire County

The Romney site created the Caring Through Sharing Resource Room a few years ago. We receive donations from Churches, civic organizations and most recently Wal-Mart in Keyser. Although, majority of the resources have been used for children in foster care, other items have been used to help families in our community who have had fires and have nothing but the clothes on their backs. We have donated baby items to Isaac's House in Keyser which is our local pregnancy center. We are in the process of making donations of gloves to our local schools since Wal-Mart has been so very generous. We have helped grand families who are raising their grandchildren and adult adoptees who are raising their own children now. We are so fortunate to have the ability to provide for not only the children and youth we serve at our Romney site but also the community.







Kanawha County

The Ray Skeens Resource Center is located at the Davis Child Shelter and plays an important role in our efforts to help families in Charleston and surrounding areas. The center provides essential resources to the children residing at the Davis Child Shelter and foster families through Charleston's Permanency Program. The center also aids in meeting the needs of families participating in the Healthy Grandfamilies Program.



Community members are very generous in their donations to the center. It is always stocked with hygiene products, blankets, winter coats, shoes, gently used and new clothes and suitcases/backpacks. These resources are constantly being used, so more items are always needed and appreciated! Donations can be dropped off at any time at the Donation Station located on the front porch of the Davis Child Shelter.

McDowell County

Children's Home Society's Forever Families Resource Center (FFRC) is a place you must stop by and see when you drive through McDowell County. The FFRC is a place that serves at-risk youth, provides needed resources to area families and houses several agency programs. The center offers WECAN Mentoring, Child Play Therapy, and Healthy Grand families. These programs offer support in a community that suffers from poverty stemming from the opioid crisis. Forever Families Resource Center also serves the community with its resource closet. Residents are welcomed to stop by the resource center, even if it's just to enjoy a hot cup of joe. We attempt to keep the FFRC well stocked with food, household items, school supplies, and essential toiletries, to help individuals and families meet their needs. We are blessed with the support of various donors to help make a difference for families in McDowell County. We could not operate our resource center without them. Notably, FFRC has a special donor that initiates a yearly fundraiser to help provide Christmas for hundreds of families in McDowell and surrounding areas.



Lastly, the Forever Families Resource Center provides a blessing box to assist with community needs. The blessing box is stocked with a variety of items such as canned goods, snacks, toilet paper, cleaning supplies, and toiletries. Anyone in need may take items from the box for free, day or night. We also have helpful members that also contribute to the blessing box. Our blessing box also serves our town police officer who works third shifts and with nothing open for miles away, he enjoys cans of Ravioli that

are left. With our community partners, donors, and friends working together to make life a little brighter for McDowell County residents, is the mission that CHSWV, Forever Families Resource Center and its related programs, strives to accomplish.










Monongalia County

The Children's Home Society of Morgantown, West Virginia opened the Giving Hope Resource Room in August 2021. The program is supported by donations from the community consisting of clothing of all types, shoes, toys, blankets, diapers, wipes, formula, and more. The resource room is open to anyone in the community at no cost, whether they are a foster parent, individual, kinship, biological parent etc. in need. These individuals are welcome to take whatever they need. If they cannot find what they need in the resource room, a staff will take their name and number and if or when that item is donated, they are called. The resource room seems to have a higher impact on single parents, kinship, and other foster families.

On April 1, 2023, 323 families in the community came by our office during our Community Giveaway event. We would like to thank our supporters and donors who helped make this happen.

The resource center at the Wheeling location has multiple items for children. Diapers, hygiene products, socks, bookbags, and A LOT of clothing. Donations come from current or prior foster families and from people and businesses in the community. We're able put together items for foster children when we are alerted to emergency placements. Clothing helps the foster parents until they can get to the store to buy clothing and other essential items to care for the child's needs. Many times, children come into foster care without any of their personal items.

Wood County

Since 1998, the Parkersburg site of Children's Home Society of WV has operated a series of neighborhood-based prevention, youth development, and family support services. The Mid-Town Family Resource Center received initial funding from the WVDHHR in 2011 to operate as one of the state's 25 Starting Points Family Resource Centers. The focus of our center is to support and strengthen neighborhood families, to provide concrete assistance in the form of food, baby items, clothing, school supplies and personal care items, and to empower families to learn about resources and opportunities available to them in the community.

The Family Resource Center has hosted a variety of activities sponsored by other programs of Children's Home Society, including dinners and events for our Permanency Program, WECAN Mentoring, Early Childhood programs and a Drop-In center for the Transitional and Independent Living Programs. The past few years, we have served the community by distributing donations of Christmas gifts to nearly 500 children in need.





In January, 2010, America's Promise designated our Parkersburg site as a Promise Place. By demonstrating that local Children's Home Society's programs provide access to caring adults, safe places, a healthy start, an effective education, and opportunities to help others, we have joined the nation's largest partnerships providing support to young people. In the fiscal year ending June 2022, services were provided to over 1800 individuals.

The Food Pantry/Hygiene Closet at the Mid-Town Family Resource Center is accessible for persons with disabilities and is open Monday - Friday 8:30 am -4:30 pm and occasionally on Saturdays or evenings for special events. The resource center provides a unique role for the community; collaborating and coordinating services to meet the needs of the families it serves.



During the 2021-2022 fiscal year, our Resource Centers assisted 4,155 individuals statewide. These children and their families were able to benefit from the in-kind support given to CHSWV by numerous businesses, individuals, churches, and civic groups throughout West Virginia. Victoria Slater-Madert began her work with Children's Home Society in 2006. From the start, Victoria became quickly devoted to Safe Haven Child Advocacy Center, as the program was just forming as an idea to meet an imperative need in our community. Victoria did not shy away at the work to be done, instead she started dreaming, starting making relationships, and gave much of her time and energy into transforming the Eastern Panhandle into a community that approached their child abuse investigations as a multidisciplinary team approach, reducing harm, holding offender's accountable, and providing families the support they

needed to achieve healing. Since that time, Safe Haven Child Advocacy Center has steadily seen an increase in the number of children and families they are serving.

Victoria was a mentor to many, and as she moved into many different roles with Children's Home Society to her most recent as the Regional Director, the Child Advocacy Center remained her "baby" and she never stopped dreaming for the ways to which we could expand and serve. Victoria was never afraid to fail when a need was present and there was an opportunity to implement a new program, or meet a gap. After careful consideration and thought, Victoria would green light new ideas and take on new projects if it opened the door to help a family or a child in our community. She modeled for our staff in Martinsburg that we are an agency that lives and breathes our mission, to promote the well-being of children and families. If we have heard it once, we have heard it three hundred times from Victoria, "every problem presents an opportunity." Through Victoria's leadership we learned that in every program and in every provision of serving others there is a cycle, to which storming, forming, norming, and performing, occurs and each step is imperative for learning, growth, and implementation. Victoria's creative ability, optimistic nature, and keen ability to problem solve was well-known in the community. These traits opened the door for many collaborations and partnerships with various community agencies Children's Home Society to make many partnerships.







To say we are devastated that Victoria is no longer with us would be an understatement. Victoria made such an impact in our community and is wholeheartedly responsible to procuring the success and growth of Safe Haven and so many other programs here in the Eastern Panhandle. Victoria never stopped dreaming of new ways that we could serve children and their families in our community. She taught us how to work together and we will honor her by carrying on her legacy by continuing to dream, grow, support children and families, and promote healing.

Safe Haven Child Advocacy Center has served over 4,000 children all because of Victoria's commitment, dedication, and relentless devotion. Our agency will proudly dedicate this program in the memory of Victoria and honor her by renaming Safe Haven Child Advocacy Center to Victoria's House Child Advocacy Center on April 28, 2023. Our hope is that we will not only continue to live and serve our mission at Victoria's house, but that we will also honor her legacy and continue her efforts of caring for our children and their families during a difficult time. We will forever be grateful for all she has done for our children and families and for all she has taught us along the way.

Ruth Eden Bailey dedicated her life to helping children find lifetime families. She was a determined advocate and worked tirelessly to find foster and adoptive homes. Ruth loved working with her families and the children that came into care, she was mission driven and her passion inspired many.

Ruth began her journey with Children's Home Society in 1993 and spent the following three decades changing the lives of hundreds of West Virginia's children. Ruth was always looking for ways to help support foster and adoptive families and thus she initiated the first CHSWV Foster Family Support Group. The foster family support group became significant in that it brought families together to share experiences, to be supportive during struggles and most importantly to celebrate with each other. Today CHSWV foster family support groups are organized across the state thanks to a special woman that was creative, passionate and enthusiastic. The Children's Home Society of West Virginia hosted its Annual Board Meeting/Dinner on November 10, 2022 at the Holiday Inn & Suites in Charleston, WV. During the meeting, Rebecca (Becky) Brown, and Yolanda Smith were named the winners of the 5th Annual Nancy Stuart-Tonkin Advocacy Award.



Becky Brown started her journey at CHSWV IN 2013 as an AmeriCorps VISTA volunteer, with intentions to volunteer one-two years, using her program development skills, to fulfill the organization's need of creating a WECAN Mentoring Program in McDowell County. However, during the program development stage, she quickly fell in love with the Society, and the children she had been recruited to serve. She was offered a full-time position in 2016 and has worked to establish one of the largest one-on-one mentoring programs in the state. Becky knows that no amazing program is built alone, so she has worked for years to develop scores of community partnerships, whom she works in concert with, to make life better for families in McDowell County. She strives to make living in one of the poorest counties in the nation a little brighter for

the children there by organizing fun community events, matching at-risk youth with mentors, and assisting kinship families with support. She serves on numerous community advisory groups and committees with which she works to coordinate county wide events and social determinants of health initiatives. Her future goals are to honor Nancy Stuart Tonkin's legacy by doing greater things to make life better for children through the partnerships she has developed, knowing no mountain is moved alone.



Yolanda Smith began her journey with Children's Home Society 8 years ago. She started as a Relief Youth Care Worker, at the Paul Miller Home in Northfork, West Virginia. Yolanda quickly realized she wanted and needed to spend more time helping the children. After working her way to full time Youth Care Worker, her supervisor encouraged her to apply for the administrative assistant position so she could expand her knowledge. Yolanda applied and was offered the position of Administrative Assistant, while also performing her duties as a Youth Care Worker.

When the Paul Miller Home closed in 2020, Yolanda began working at the Children's Home Society's, Forever Families Resource Center in Northfork.

She continues to help at risk children and families in the community providing them with resources to meet their daily needs. She also works with grand families in the Healthy Grand Families Program. Yolanda's mission is to help and advocate for as many children and families in McDowell and surrounding counties as she possibly can.

About our Honoree

The Children's Home Society of West Virginia Board of Directors established the Nancy Stuart-Tonkin Advocacy Award beginning in 2018 to annually honor an outstanding advocate who has successfully promoted the well-being of children and families in West Virginia.

In the 1970's Nancy Tonkin helped organize the first Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) effort in West Virginia and after that successfully worked to make the MDT's part of the child welfare law. She also helped make the role of guardian ad litem part of public policy. Later she was a leader in getting per diem rates for private agency foster care increased from \$35 to \$55.

Other child welfare initiatives that Nancy championed included; family resource networks, infant screenings, home visitation and efforts around child abuse prevention. For 40 years Nancy worked to ensure that child welfare laws were designed to protect children and preserve families.

Nancy was a trusted advisor to the Children's Home Society in all public policy matters. She was one of our strongest advocates for our permanency and child well-being efforts.
