# WHO WE ARE

The Children's Home Society of West Virginia is a private, non-profit child welfare organization founded in 1896. The Society is a participatory organization consisting of employees, foster families, adoptive families, volunteers, Board members, Directors Emeriti, advisory council members, donors, benefactors, supporters, and friends. We are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors that is representative of the communities we serve from around the state. We are licensed to provide child welfare and behavioral health services in West Virginia. We are a member agency of the Emergency Shelter Providers Network, the National Council For Adoption, the Foster Family Treatment Association, the Youth Collaboratory and the Children's Home Society of America. We are fully accredited by the Council on Accreditation of Services for Families and Children.

Comprehensive child welfare, behavioral health, social casework and advocacy services are provided to approximately **15,943** children each year from 13 primary locations throughout the state. Some of our current programs are adoption, foster care, in-home and in-community services for children and families, emergency shelter care, parent education training, prenatal and early childhood services, volunteer and mentoring, visitation and reunification, school based social work, and comprehensive assessment services.

Ruth Eden Bailey dedicated her life to helping children find lifetime families. She was a determined advocate and worked tirelessly to find foster and adoptive homes. Ruth loved working with her families and the children that came into care, she was mission driven and her passion inspired many. Ruth began her journey with Children's Home Society in 1993 and spent the following three decades changing the lives of hundreds of West Virginia's children. Ruth was always looking for ways to help support foster and adoptive families and thus she initiated the first CHSWV Foster Family Support Group. The foster family support group became significant in that it brought families together to share experiences, to be supportive during struggles and most importantly to celebrate with each other.



Today CHSWV foster family support groups are organized across the state thanks to a special woman that was creative, passionate and enthusiastic. Ruth left a legacy of encouragement, love and kindness.

# NO SHAVE FOR THE BRAVE HEROES

In 2012, Jefferson County Sheriff's Department put down their razors, encouraged their deputies to grow beards, and challenged the community to help them raise money for the children served by Victoria's House Child Advocacy Center (then Safe Haven). This was not only was a morale builder in the office and a great way to bring awareness of the work that Victoria's house does in the community, but this fundraiser grew into an annual fundraising tradition that has spanned more than a decade, spread across the state and for Victoria's house has raised over \$50,000.

In 2022, the No Shave for the Brave Campaign was a bitter sweet fundraising year, not only was Victoria's House Child Advocacy Center grieving the loss of their fearless leader, Victoria Slater-Madert, but the Jefferson County Sheriffs Department too was grieving the loss of Captain David Colbert, one of the driving forces behind the fundraiser from the start. Collectively, the Jefferson County Sheriffs Department and the Berkeley County Sheriffs Department raised over \$10,000 for Victoria's House during the Annual campaign this year, which was dedicated in Victoria and Captain Colberts honor and was truly an astounding success. Victoria's House Child Advocacy Center's mission is to promote the team approach to the investigation and prosecution of child abuse cases. Funding raised through this campaign allows for the program to ensure that children and their families receive a coordinated, team approach during the investigation and prosecution so the children and family can focus on healing.

# EMERGENCY CHILD SHELTER AND PERMANENCY PROGRAM NUMBERS

The Society's mission has remained constant throughout the years, to bring permanency to the lives of children. Our focus on lifetime and families continues to bring hope, happiness, and well being to children needing a family of their own. Our statewide adoption and foster care program has been instrumental in providing families that are dedicated to caring for West Virginia's children.

The Children's Home Society of West Virginia operates eight shelters providing short-term and emergency care for youth in crisis. The program is designed to accomplish two basic purposes: to meet the child's emergent need for residential care in a safe, supportive setting and to provide a period of time for the Department of Health and Human Resources and shelter staff to assess the child's needs and develop the most suitable plan for continued care and protection.

In 1984, Susan was appointed interim CEO for a period of time in January 1985. She always did whatever was needed making sure the agency moved forward and in the right direction. She served as Director of Administrative Services until her retirement in 2010. After her retirement, Susan faithfully served as a Children's Home Society Director Emeritus, and on the Human Rights Committee and rarely missed a meeting.

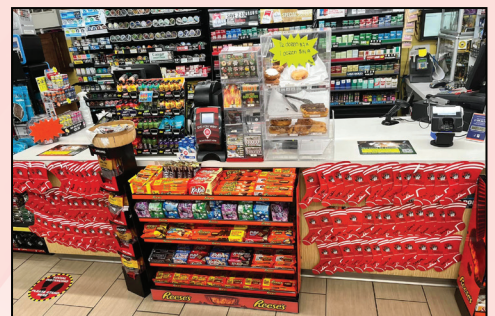
