We would like to thank the Riverside High School Honor Society for purchasing gifts for the kids from their Christmas wish lists.



The Huntington Permanency team was able to offer Our families great support and fun. At the beginning of December, we hosted an extended foster parent date night, where parents dropped off their kiddos for three hours and had the opportunity to Christmas shop, wrap, eat out or just relax at home. And we had the opportunity to spend extra time with all the kiddos we adore.

On December 15, Huntington Community Church was gracious enough to allow us to host our foster family Christmas Party in their fellowship hall. Nearly all of our active families attended the party. We had Rocco's lasagna and spaghetti, games and crafts, and a gift for each child and parent. Everyone appeared to have a great time, and it's always great to see our little foster family community come together.

Huntington received a confirmed date for their fourth official family adoption, and continue to work on a sibling set of three that will be adopted in the near future!

This 2023 Christmas season for SAH Region 2 program was an extremely busy yet fulfilling time of year. The Christmas season is a fun time to spend with our families where we can focus on the happy moments while continuing to assist them with any needs they may encounter. This year, we had the pleasure of serving 34 youth and families in the Kanawha, Cabell, Wayne, Putnam, Lincoln, and Mason counties.

All of our Safe at Home youth enjoyed their Christmas presents and opened them with excitement; however, Wraparound Facilitator Amy Long shares one story with a sixteen-year-old client that stood out the most for her.

"This 16-year-old young man received a pair of Timberland boots and a PlayStation gift card from the Safe at Home program. His eyes lit up when he opened the Timberland box and he looked at me with surprise and gratitude and said, "You got them". He put the boots on his feet immediately and proudly walked around his home. He smiled during my whole visit and thanked me when I left. He told me that he had never owned a pair of Timberlands and was only joking when he asked for them. I have never seen this young man smile so much.

The following week, we visited his JPO and she asked about his Christmas, he only listed the items that Safe at Home purchased as his gifts and his grandmother added that she had expected money that didn't come through leaving her unable to purchase gifts this year, news that I had not been made aware of until this moment. Safe at Home made a true difference in his Christmas as we continue to help make a difference in other ways for this young man and his grandmother."



Our Little Red Stocking campaign hit an all time high in 2023, bringing in over \$36,500 through the selling of our stockings in local stores and donations to our campaign. In Greenbrier, Summers, Monroe and Pocahontas counties, we had 131 small businesses agree to sell our stockings this year. Among those businesses was ParMar store #186 in Caldwell who went above and beyond for children. 
Martinsburg Staff Holiday Party

In Northfork this year, the 6th annual Coal Country Christmas Event, in partnership with Cleveland Cliffs Incorporated, raised \$80,000 to serve youth in McDowell County with Christmas gifts. Over the years, this event has generously assisted hundreds of children and families struggling throughout the holidays. This event served community members, healthy grandfamilies, and WECAN families, overall serving 370 children and 165 families.

A Christmas tent was set up outside for families to walk through while Cleveland Cliffs' employees and partners loaded vehicles with presents. Santa handed out candy canes and gift bags, while Olaf posed for photos with the children. Each child was offered a polaroid photo to take home including themselves and Olaf. 

Phi Delta Kapa, Red Greer, and the Santa Squad donated two sets of stockings, one set was given to kids as they left early in December, the other one was given on Christmas Eve.

Overall, we were able to take care and celebrate 3 youth that left the shelter in December. Christmas Day gifts were provided by three main contributors. One was anonymous who came by the shelter with a very positive and uplifting conversation wanting to help and gifted us with \$3,000 towards Christmas. House Calls Hospice sponsored 6 youth with their wish lists. Lindsey Green sponsored two of our youth with their wish lists. Our generous donors provided our kids with McDonalds and Chinese take-out for the Christmas holiday. Arthur N Gustke Child shelter was also provided with a \$1,000 grant from the Robert E. Fouss Memorial Fund with Parkersburg Area Community Foundation. This was to provide each kid with two paris of shoes, one for December and one for Christmas Day. The kids received their Crocs that they all wanted and then they got their wish list item shoes for Christmas morning.

We are thankful for the community support for the entire month of December making new positive memories for these residents while they are with us.

Right From the Start program provided food for Christmas Day for 8 families. Groceries included turkey, chicken or ham, potatoes, apples, oranges, cookie dough, green bean casserole supplies, eggs, cereal, pancake mix and syrup, onions, butter, bread, hot cocoa, rolls, gravy, applesauce, etc. Six additional families were given pajamas, clothing, toys, wrapping paper and gift bags.

Every infant and sibling in our Right from the Start program were given age-appropriate books. Every mother participating in the program was given a candle and chocolates. Approximately 50 families recieved gifts. (Some families have mothers and infants as clients).

Once again, this year, the home visitors spent considerable donated time and effort to make sure that these items were picked up and delivered to their families.

Parents as Teachers (PAT) started the month of December with a wonderful event at the Grand Central Mall. We held a successful Roll & Read with activities centered around the book "Santa and the Goodnight Train" and had over 30 families in attendance.









The PAT program introduced Pat, the Elf on the Shelf to our Facebook group. Everyone enjoyed seeing the daily posts.

Through donations and funding by the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting program (MIECHV), we provided all families with the following:

A book for every child in the family, along with a new pair of pajamas. Each enrolled child received a new, developmentally appropriate toy. All families received gift cards to local restaurant and to purchase groceries. Our Parents for Teachers Program (PAT) provided Christmas help to 22 enrolled families and provided books and pajamas to 36 children, including siblings or other children in the home who are not enrolled in PAT.

One enrolled family received additional support due to having additional children in the home that were too old to receive assistance through Toys for Tots. We provided her with gift cards to cover taking the children to a matinee movie and Kroger, along with a gift card to order pizza. The mother expressed her gratitude over and over again and so appreciated the additional help that she would never had asked for.

The Permanency program was gifted \$2,500 to provide Christmas to children and families through the PM Real Estate Company's (PMC) annual Spirit of Giving fund. Other donors included Books a Million, Scots Landscaping, Truist Banks, and several donors donated to the Thirty-One Tote Drive organized and led by CHS staff Kim Conrad. With these funds and donations our Permanency Staff were able to shop for over 50 children and provide a Christmas Party at the First Baptist Church of Williamstown for these children and their foster



families. Every child received a gift, book, and pajamas. We were also able to provide hams and poinsettias to our foster families who were present which totaled 17 families. Our families were very thankful for these provisions and the children were especially excited to see and hear Mr. Claus read 'Twas the Night Before Christmas at the Christmas Party along with his sidekick Buddy the Elf.

For the 2023 Christmas Season, our Independent Living (IL) and Transitional Living (TL) programs served 29 youth and 9 children. The Independent Living program assisted 8 youth, who were in foster care or came directly out of state's custody. This year our community was exceptionally generous to our programs. Youth and their families were adopted by multiple individuals and businesses. Highmark West Virginia provided stockings, presents, and gift cards for 8 youth and 2 children. Stockings and gifts from Truist Bank, Red Greer's Santa Squad, Donna Kay Thompson, Rose Hughes and family, Michelle Graziani and family, and Telma Poole were provided to 28 youth. Joga Bonito Soccer Academy generously donated new sports equipment to be divided between the programs at our site. Our youth were very excited to receive their gifts, several of them stated that

they were overwhelmed by the kindness of the community, and that this was one of the best Christmas seasons they had ever had. One young lady said she didn't expect to get any gifts this year but loved everything that she received and felt very blessed to know that so many people out there thought that she mattered. Food baskets were also provided to youth who requested them this year. For those who did not request a food basket, a family style community Christmas dinner was provided in partnership with the Circles campaign of the Mid-Ohio Valley.







We provided gifts for 5 Grandfamilies with a total of 13 grand children and also provided a Christmas meal to a Grandfamily of six which included ham and sides.

The MidTown Family Support Center held a Caregiver's Day Out on December 9th, where 6 kids were served breakfast and lunch, created crafts, played games and watched a Christmas show.

We had a lovely Christmas party on December 19th with our Afterschool Families, where we set up a Taco Bar and served cookies. Parents and children created Cookie Mix in a Jar to take home. 25 children received a gift bag and stocking filled with a treat bag, hot chocolate mix, snacks, gloves, socks and a small gift. Their gift bags also included a board game or individual toy, stuffed animal and books. And our Safe at Home program provided families with gift cards that would help provide Christmas for the kids.
